2023 Maryland ALICE Report Released

This spring, United Ways of Maryland and their research partner United For ALICE released the 2023 ALICE Report, ALICE in the Crosscurrents: COVID and Financial Hardship in Maryland, which detailed the effects of the pandemic on ALICE households across the state.

In the report, we can clearly see that pandemic aids, including child tax credits, blunted the financial crisis for ALICE households, but with these short-term solutions no longer available, warning signs are on the horizon.

In Maryland, the number of households unable to afford a basic cost of living grew by more than 70,000 during the first two years of the pandemic. Frederick County saw an increase of over 7,000 ALICE households from 2019 to 2021, making up approximately 10% of the total increase in the state.

The report clearly details the rising needs in our local ALICE households. With more struggling families in our community, the importance of programs like United Way's Pathways to Financial Stability has become even more apparent.

The full-scale local report for Frederick County will be released this fall. We look forward to sharing more information with you on how Frederick County has weathered the storm at a variety of events scheduled around the release.

United Way Celebrates 28th Pathway to Homeownership Graduate

After nearly two years of an inflated housing market preventing many local ALICE families from purchasing homes, United Way of Frederick County is delighted to celebrate the Pathway to Homeownership's 28th graduate!

Laura Harris hit the reset button on her life in 2016. Following her divorce, she moved to Mount Airy with her two kids and started a new career. As she began slowly working her way up the ladder, she quickly found herself racking up credit card debt to get by, something all too familiar to many ALICE households.

In 2018, Laura tapped into her skills as a former Social Worker to find resources. She didn't want to rent anymore so she started with homebuyer resources. She quickly found the City of Frederick Department of Housing and Human Services' Homebuyer Education Workshop, which began the journey to her new home.

In 2021, Laura found United Way's Pathway to Homeownership. She completed the program in just under two years, working with her budget coach to pay down debt and build savings. The budget coaching program made Laura nervous as it's vulnerable to share all your financial decisions, but her coach was her biggest cheerleader, making her comfortable as she moved towards financial stability.

Finally, in 2023, Laura purchased a new home for her and her family! As they slowly adjust to their new home and enjoy the financial freedoms that come with homeownership, Laura is also enjoying the extra family time it has afforded them.

"Even if [the kids] are on their devices, we're all sitting in the same room. You know, just being able to converse more, more family time; it seems silly, but really it's a huge difference to me."

To those still working through the Pathway to Homeownership program, she says, "You've got to stick with it, you've got to be committed to it. And if you do commit to it, I feel like it's very rewarding once you're able to step back and see where that got you."

Budget Coaching Helps ALICE Families Take Control of Their Lives

For many local families, creating and implementing a budget plays an important role in their overall finances, but for ALICE families, this step is absolutely essential.

In order to eliminate debt, accrue savings, and ultimately achieve financial stability, it is crucial that ALICE families take a look at their monthly spending and gain a better understanding of where they may be able to make changes.

United Way of Frederick County is proud to offer a free Budget Coach program as a key step on the Pathway to Financial Stability. This program is a 12-session financial wellness program, designed to help individuals create and follow a budget while developing a 3-5 year financial goal.

Participants are paired with a trusted budget coach, who becomes their financial cheerleader, working one-on-one with them to provide resources, weigh pros and cons of various financial choices, and celebrate their financial successes.

Recent graduate of the Pathway to Homeownership Laura was nervous about exposing her debt and financial mistakes to her budget coach, but any fears she had were squashed when she began working with Keshava.

He was kind and non-judgmental, giving her a pat on the back anytime she avoided putting more money on her credit card or reduced a monthly bill. His support made all the difference as she worked towards purchasing her new home.

When asked about the program, Keshava said it is one of his most rewarding experiences. "It's rare that you can build such an impactful and meaningful relationship with someone else by volunteering. I come away from my coaching sessions feeling energized, grateful, and a bit in awe of the hard work the savers put in to achieve their goal of homeownership. I can't recommend a better way to spend your time and energy in giving back to the Frederick community."
